

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- English I, II, III, IV 4 credits
- Mathematics 3 credits (4 recommended)
- Science 3 credits (4 recommended)
- Social Studies 3.5 credits (4 recommended)
 - O Includes 1 credit in U.S. History and 0.5 credit in Civics/American Government
- Physical Education 1 credit
- Health 0.5 credit

- Fine Arts 0.5 credit
- Practical Arts 1 credit
- World Language No requirement for graduation (3 years of the same language recommended)
- Electives 7.5 credits

Verify your schedule AND transcript to ensure that all requirements are met for graduation.

Admissions Requirements:

- High school transcript
- Personal essay on a topic of particular meaning and interest to you. The essay should reflect who you are and speak to your values, goals, and aspirations
 as a student.
- Letter of recommendation from a teacher, guidance counselor or other school official
- 4 years of English
- 3 years of mathematics (4 years required for Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Nursing and Physician Assistant applicants)
- 3 or more years of science (4 years required for applicants to the Schools of Nursing and Health Sciences)
- · 2 years of social science and foreign language
- 3 academic electives
- Test Scores: see details below

SEPTEMBER - SENIOR YEAR

- Individual Planning Meeting w/your School Counselor (parents encouraged to attend)
 Review transcript, graduation progress, and post-secondary process
- Register for SATs (fee waivers available through School Counseling Office)
- Research and finalize College List
- Edit and revise your College Essay
- Continue college visits, tours and interviews
- Complete Common Application and/or school-specific applications
- Link Common Application and Naviance accounts (facilitated by School Counselors)
- Officially request teacher recommendations via Naviance (<u>Step-by-Step</u>)
- Carefully consider your responsibilities, if applying for Early Decision or Early Action

Students are responsible for sending score reports (electronically) to colleges directly from College Board.**



ADVANCED PLACEMENT

What do "credit" and "advanced placement" mean?

Most colleges offer credit or advanced placement, or both, for qualifying AP scores.

- Ability to earn college credit differs by subject and college
 - AP Credit Policy Search
- Many colleges recognize that your AP scores may demonstrate that you already know the material in certain courses they offer, so they'll let you skip those courses. These could be introductory courses required in your major, or core courses that the college requires all its students to take. Skipping theses courses (so you can go right into advanced courses) is called granting you advanced placement.
 - Some students use the advanced placement earned through AP to free up space in their schedule so they can pursue a double major or take part in an internship or other special program.

THE COMMON APPLICATION

The **Common Application** is used for over 90% of college applications.

- One application
- One essay
- Easy submission

When applying to schools, be sure to select the following:

- 2 safety schools
- 2 target schools
- 2 reach schools

*It is imperative that you communicate with your School Counselor and inform them of when you will be submitting your applications.

*Please note all deadlines and secondary reports or forms specific to each college.

NCAA ELIGIBILITY



Grade 11

- Register with the <u>NCAA Eligibility Center</u>.
- Check with your counselor to make sure you will graduate, on time, with the required number of NCAA core courses.
- Take the <u>SAT and /or ACT</u> and submit your scores to the NCAA using code 9999.
- At the end of the year, ask your counselor to upload your <u>official transcript</u> to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

Grade 12

- Finish your last NCAA core courses.
- Take the SAT/ACT again, if necessary, and submit your scores to the NCAA using code 9999.
- Complete all academic and <u>amateurism</u> questions in your NCAA Eligibility Center account.
- After you graduate, ask your counselor to submit your final official transcript with proof of graduation to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

FINANCIAL AID IN A NUTSHELL

WHAT EXACTLY IS FINANCIAL AID?

It is any grant or scholarship, loan, or paid employment offered to help a student meet his/her college
expenses.

MAIN TYPES

There are 3 main types of financial aid:

- Grants & Scholarships Federal or institutional awards that **do not** need to be repaid
- Work Study Program Part-time campus employment subsidized by the Federal Government
- Loans Low-interest student or parent loans that will need to be repaid

When you apply for financial aid, your financial aid package will likely include student loans. There are generally two types of student loans:


- Federal student loans-Funded by the Federal government
- Private student loans- Non Federal loans; made by a private lender such as a bank, credit union, or school
